Summary of US P3 Markets

38 states have P3-enabling legislation.

- Of those, 35 are enabled for Transportation assets
 - 2 have transit-specific P3 authority:TN and NH; and MO is specific to ports
 - MI exercises P3 through Home Rule. NY and NJ access P3s via PANY&NJ
 - CA not authorized for state road P3 procurement (Caltrans).
- Of those, 14 states are broadly enabled across multiple infrastructure sectors.
- Of those, one state is enabled for public buildings only: ND
- Of those, one state is enabled for water projects only: HI

Puerto Rico & Washington, DC have broadly enabling P3 authority.
